2022 General Meeting

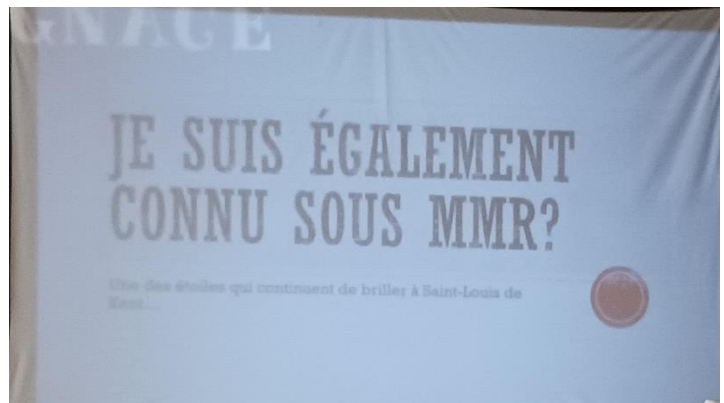
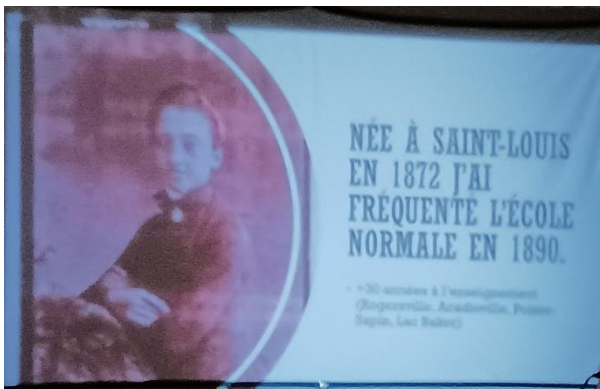
Finally, we were able to have our 27th ARNB Annual General Meeting. This was the first assembly since 2019 due to the pandemic. We met on June 5th where we had our general assembly followed by a conference given by Robert Richard of the Center d'études acadiennes Anselme-Chiasson of the Université de Moncton and by a delicious fricot supper.

Attached with this newsletter, you will find the minutes of the meeting. Here is a short summary:

- 1 – Following the adoption of the agenda, the presentation of the members of the Executive Board and the reading of the minutes of June 2, 2019, we had the presentation of the financial report for 2019 to April 30, 2022. (See attached details)
- 2 – Association dues have been increased from \$5 per individual to \$10 per individual or \$15 per family. No increase had been made since the creation of the Association and it is becoming more and more difficult to cover expenses and the publication of the bulletin.
- 3 – Some changes have been made to the statutes of the Association. Clauses 3.1.2, 3.4.1, 4.2.2 and 4.2.3 have been modified or added.
- 4 – We also had elections:
 - Paul Richard remains the Association's President for another mandate
 - Jonathan Richard has been voted vice-president
 - Gervais Richard is now treasurer
 - The councillors are Laura Richard, Émile Richard and Paul Richard (from Beresford)

Marie-Marguerite Richard

Administrative History/Bibliographical note



Parents Auguste Richard (1842-1929) and Pélagie Maillet (1843-1929), Marie-Marguerite Richard was born in Saint-Louis de Kent on December 28th, 1872. In 1890, Marie-Marguerite Richard graduated from the Normal School of Fredericton.

For more than thirty-two years, her teaching career took her to schools in Rogersville, Rosaireville, Acadieville, Saint-Louis de Kent, Pointe-Sapin and Lac Baker. She also stayed with the Daughters of Mary of the Assumption in Campbellton..



Marie-Marguerite died on September 20th, 1961. She is the author of most of the photos found in album 1608.01 of the Center d'études acadiennes Anselme-Chiasson. Cousin of Marie-Marguerite Richard, Father Martin-Léonard Richard was parish priest at Lac Baker from 1904 to 1937.

The Acadiens of Miquelon

Following the article on the Richards of Saint-Pierre and Miquelon, I thought I would share with you some of the text found in the book “Miquelon L’Acadie française en Amérique du Nord”.

The Miquelon People from Beaubassin to Miquelon

The study of the various writings and censuses that have come down to us since the creation of Acadia and the census of Acadian refugees from Miquelon in 1767, allow us to state that 75% of the Acadians who have lived and who still live in Miquelon are from Beaubassin or its region and that in coming to Miquelon their only desire was to rebuild the village or their homeland which they had lost in the whirlwinds of war.

The Acadian Population of Miquelon



Deported like their unfortunate congeners to the English colonies in eastern America, part of this population ended up in Georgia. As soon as they arrived, they managed to get to South Carolina where the Governor gave them permission to build small boats and even issued them passports. Once these authorizations were obtained, they began to slowly ascend the American coasts, stopping from port to port, suffering bullying and ill-treatment of all kinds.

This is where two characters appear, and their decisions will weigh very heavily in the history of Miquelon. Jacques Vigneau son of Maurice sometimes known under the name of Jacob Morris and his second wife Marguerite Bourg Widow of Guillaume Cyr of Beaubassin. How they learned that the Treaty of Paris was signed between France and England, returning the islands of Saint-Pierre and Miquelon to France, we will

probably never know. Still, having learned this news, they decided to buy a boat which they named the St-Jacques, to gather their respective families and to sail towards Miquelon, where they arrived at the beginning of October 1763 at the head of a group of 112 Acadians, bearing the names of Vigneau, Cyr, Hébert, Bourg, Bourgeois, Thériault and LeBlanc. The first six surnames had, following several marriages, very close family ties.

Four families from France in the spring of the same year had preceded them there. They were Briand, Coste, Girardin and Detcherry.

Although having received specific orders from the King of France not to accept Acadian refugees on the islands, Governor D’Angeac authorized them to settle temporarily, probably at a place called “La Roche à Bêche”.

A second group of about 110 people arrived from Chédabouctou in August 1764, headed by Joseph Vigneau who brought along the Arsenaults, Bertrand, Blanchard, Boudreau, Bourgeois, Chiasson, Comeau and Cormier.

Two other groups arrived in August 1764, the first from Île St-Jean and made up of the Béliveau, Blanchard, Boudreau, Chiasson, Comeau, Deveau, Doucet, Lapierre and Renaud dit Provencal families, the second from Pointe de Beauséjour, with the Arsenault, Bonnevie, Brault, Boudreau, Bourg, Hébert, Chiasson, Cormier, Gaudet, Gousman, Nuirat, Onel and Poirier families.

A fifth and last group arrived from Halifax in May 1766. These last arrivals bore the names of Arsenault, Bourque, Comeau, Cyr, Damours, Dugas, Landry, Gaudet, Gaudreau, Gauthier, Guédry, Goguen, Guibault, LeBlanc, Moise, Pitre and Richard.



The 1767 census shows that 551 people were identified as Acadians belonging to approximately one hundred families. While their Acadian brothers who had managed to reach the territory of the former Acadia had known relatively peaceful days, the unfortunate Acadians of Miquelon were about to undergo three new deportations.

1755-1816 Sixty-one years of wandering and misfortunes

Having brought their people together in Miquelon, the Acadians very quickly got to work, some fishing, others building farms. This reconstituted little Beaubassin, the Acadians thought they had found peace and a country there, but they remained undesirables.



1764 – The French government first tried to get rid of the Acadians by suggesting that they settle in Cayenne, French Guiana. A small group accepted the adventure, but they could never adapt to this place.

1767 – This same government cut the subsidies to the Acadians and announced to them that they would be repatriated to France, which was done in the months that followed and 586 people were exiled.

1768 – The Acadians were allowed to return to Miquelon where they resumed their fishing activities. For ten years, they finally found a well-deserved peace and relative prosperity.

1778 – The King of France supporting the insurgents of the thirteen American colonies against England, war broke out between these two countries. As a result, the Islands of Saint-Pierre and Miquelon were captured, and the populations again deported to France. The exile was to last five years.

1783 sees the return to the islands. Unfortunately, not all of them will return. Victims of the epidemics which raged in Europe at that time, a large number perished. Others, tired of this wandering life, decided to stay in France. It is only about 60% of the deportees who return to Miquelon where again they rebuild their houses, rebuild their fishing boats and go back to work. The French Revolution of 1789 worried the Acadians. Catholic people if there is one, the Acadians with good reason, feared the consequences of these events, of which once again they will be victims.

1793 – A new war broke out between France and England, once again the islands were taken by the English and for the fourth time since 1755 the Acadians suffered deportation. This time the exile lasted 23 years because it was not until 1816 that they were able to return home.

From Miquelon to the old Acadia and Québec

From 1767 to 1793, several groups of Acadians decided to join their old Acadia and Quebec. Thus, today, in the Îles de la Madeleine, in Cocagne, and Richibouctou in New Brunswick, in Île Madame and Chéticamp in Cape Breton, in Rustico and Abraham Village in Prince Edward Island, in Bonaventure and Gaspésie, from Natashquan to Sept-Îles on the North Shore of Quebec, in St-Grégoire du Nicolet, Bécancour, Trois-Rivières, Quebec and Montraé, live thousands of people, many of whom between them, ignore that they are from Miquelon and that most of the ancestors, expelled from Beaubassin are buried there, like Jacques Vigneau, the ancestor of most Vigneau in North America, where he rests with his wife Marguerite Bourg, in this land of France which they had chosen as a country.

The census records and the Richard families

The Census of 1701

In the last newsletter, we gave an overview of the 1700 census. Here we will look at the 1701 census, only one year later. This census covers three regions: Port-Royal, Beaubassin and Les Mines (Grand Pré). Do you see your Richard ancestors there?

In 1701, according to the census, there are now 183 men, 176 women, 407 boys, 351 girls and 17 servants for a total of 1,134 individuals. In addition, the census indicates the following information: The Acadians possess 214 firearms, 1,807 horned beasts, 1,796 woolen beasts, 1,173 pigs and 1,136 acres of land in value of cleared land.

In **Port-Royal**, the first family connected to the Richard that we find is that of Jean Dupuy (27 years old) and Magdeleine Richard (23 years old). They have, in 1701, one boy Louis, aged 7 and a servant (Anne Comeau aged 16). No other possessions are listed on the census.

Then we find **Michel Richard (20 years old)**: Pierre Dupuy 30, Magdeleine Landry (his wife) 47, Children: Michel Richard 20, Anthoine 17, Pierre 15, René 13, Marie 8, Jeanne 6, Charles 4; Maid: Thérèse Miraude (Mirande) 18; 2 firearms, 22 horned beasts, 30 woolen beasts, 20 pigs, 16 acres of land in value. (Note: Magdeleine was the wife of René Richard dit Sieur de Beupré. Michel, Anthoine, Pierre and René would be the children of René Richard and Mageleine Landry.

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The next Richard family in the census is that of Alexandre Richard and Isabel Petitpas: Alexandre Ricahrd 38, Isabel Petitpas (his wife) 30, Children: Pierre 5, Jean-Baptiste 1; servant Anne Petitpas 13; 1 firearm, 10 horned beasts, 15 woolen beasts, 7 pigs, 4 acres of valuable land.

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Subsequently, we find François Brossart (Broussard) 53, Catherine Richard (his wife) 38; Children: Pierre 18, François 5, Claude 3, Alexandre 2, Magdeleine 20, Marion 16, Catherine 10, Isabelle 7; 5 firearms, 10 horned beasts, 18 woolen beasts, 17 pigs 1t 10 arpens of land in value.

In 1701, these were the only families listed as still being in Port-Royal. The next Richard is in **Beaubassin**:

Martin Richard, his wife, 3 boys, 1 girl, 6 acres of land in value, 14 horned beasts, 3 woolen beasts, 4 pigs and 1 gun. In the Beaubassin census, no details are given concerning the names of the wife and children. Martin is the only one who settled in Beaubassin at that time.

We then find one last family of Richard in Les Mines (In the Grande Prée). It is that of Pierre Richard:

Pierre Richard, his wife, 2 boys, 2 girls, 10 arpens of valuable land, 12 horned beasts, 9 woolen beasts, 17 pigs, and 2 firearms.

Commemorative Plaque

Last year, I received an email from Michel P. Richard. He had just visited Strathcona Park (at 25 Range Road on the banks of the Rideau River in Ottawa) with his sisters. They found a plaque in honor of Michel Richard dit Sansoucy on which was inscribed “**Premier Richard (Michel Richard) au Canada. Michel Richard 1630-1687 – Les Racines se sont rendues à mon cœur. »**

Michel asked me if I knew of this plaque’s origins. I then got in touch with the administrators of the Strathcona Park. They were kind enough to send me the contact details of the person responsible for setting up the commemorative plaque.

The plaque was put up by Maurice Lachapelle in 2007 as a wedding gift to his husband Paul Richard of Sainte-Marie de Kent on July 7, 2007. Paul's sister had researched his family tree and Maurice decided to plant a tree and erect the plaque for this special occasion.

Every year since, the couple celebrates their wedding anniversary with a picnic under this tree.

Richard Wall of Fame

Ernest René Richard (1887 – 1957)



Lecturer in contract law (1928-1934); B.A., St. Joseph, 1906; LL.B., Dalhousie, 1910; M.A., St Joseph, 1930; Chairman of the New Brunswick Commissioners for Uniformity of Legislation in Canada and Member of the Executive Council of the Canadian Bar Association; Commissioner responsible for revising the laws of New Brunswick, 1926-1927.

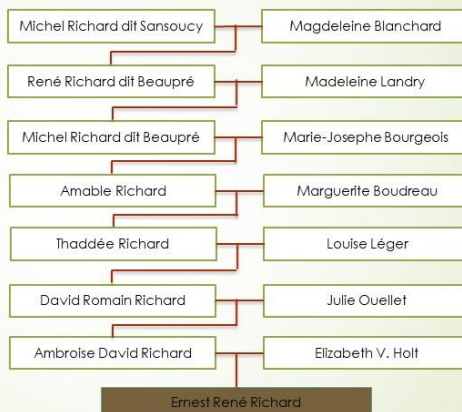
Before 1945, there had been only one Acadian professor at Mount Allison University: Ernest Renée Richard, originally from Dorchester. He taught law at the university from 1928 to 1934 and became mayor of Sackville in the 1950s.

Ernest René Richard was born on September 25, 1887 in Dorchester, Westmorland County, New Brunswick. He was the son of the Honorable Ambroise David Richard (1849-1917) and Elizabeth V. Holt (1860-1941). He received his early education in Sainte-Anne-de-la-Pocatière, Quebec. He received a B.A. from Saint Joseph University in 1906, an LL. from Dalhousie University in 1910 and an M.Sc. from St. Joseph's in 1930. He began practicing law at Dalhousie, New Brunswick in 1911 and moved to Sackville in 1919. He taught at the Mount Allison University in contract law from 1928 to 1934. Between 1934 and 1940, he was a member of the Pension Appeals Court in Ottawa. He was President of the Uniform Laws Commissioners of Canada of New Brunswick from 1933 to 1934, Commissioner for the Revision of the Laws of New Brunswick from 1926 to 1927 and served on the Executive Council of the Canadian Bar Association.

Ernest René Richard served nearly four terms as mayor of the town of Sackville from 1954 to 1957. He died on November 5, 1957, while in office. In an article honoring the mayor following his passing, the Sackville Tribune Post wrote: "His talents could have been welcomed anywhere in Canada, but he preferred to live here in this small town of Sackville...The call of the Maritimes, where he first took his roots, where his Acadian ancestors lived, was very strong. »

He married Grace Mildred Murry (1894-1973) in Montreal, in 1925, and the couple had three children: Julie (Class of 52), René (Class of 57) and Marie. While in Sackville, Grace served as Alderman and Regent of Lord Sackville, Chapter of I.O.D.E. Ernest René is buried at Sackville Rural Cemetery in Sackville, New Brunswick.

Dennis Richard of Los Angeles, CA is looking to identify the man in the photo. He found it among photos to his parents but has no information except his name: Napoleon Richard.

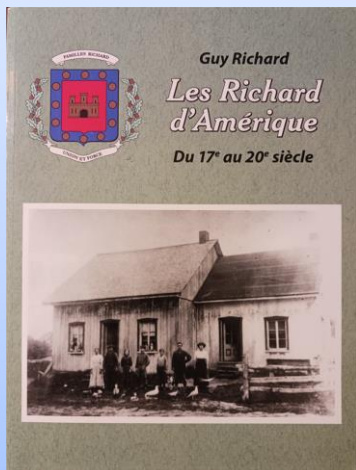

Acadian Recipes

Fricot

Ingredients:

2 Liters of water
1-1/2 lb of chicken
4 tablespoons of margarine
1 onion
6 medium carrots sliced
10 medium potatoes
2 teaspoons of salt
1 teaspoon of pepper
2 cups of flour
2 tablespoons of baking powder
2 tablespoons of chicken stock
1 tablespoon of summer savory



Instructions :

- Boil water with margarine and onion.
- Add chicken, 1 teaspoon of salt and pepper.
- Cook for 20 minutes at medium heat.
- Add carrots and cook for 10 minutes
- Add the potatoes, chicken stock and summer savory
- Cook for 20 minutes of until the potatoes are cooked
- In a bowl, mix the flour, baking powder and 1 teaspoon of salt
- Mix well. Add some boiling stock from the fricot to make a dough
- Add to the fricot by making balls. Let cook for 5 minutes with the cover.
